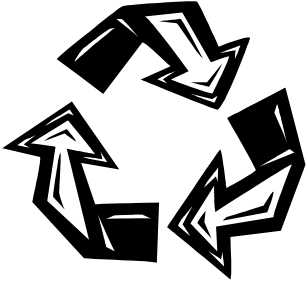

### **DISCARD ALKALINE BATTERIES IN YOUR REGULAR TRASH WEEK OF APRIL 5, 2009**

Dispose of your dead alkaline batteries in the regular trash, where they will be incinerated with other garbage. They do NOT contain mercury.

This past week the Town of Mansfield ceased recycling alkaline batteries, because it became too costly for taxpayers. Secondly, the process of sorting out alkaline from rechargeable batteries required so much staff time. The town began that recycling in 1999 when mercury was used in the manufacture of alkaline batteries. Mansfield had continued recycling - at a cost of 46 cents per pound - even though the batteries no longer contained mercury..

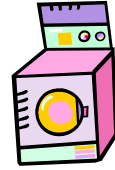
The town of Mansfield will continue to accept rechargeable batteries at the transfer station, because they DO contain hazardous heavy metals, such as cadmium. Other towns in the area must still take their spent rechargeables to the hazardous waste site in Willington.

### **PLANT NATIVE SPECIES WEEK OF APRIL 12, 2009**

When you "stock up on all your spring shrubs, flowers and other ground-cover plantings, look for native species... Plant varieties that are indigenous to your growing region." These are more suited to our soils and growing conditions, and will thrive with much less care, artificial fertilizers and watering. "Also, ask the nursery if you can return the plastic pots after you've finished planting; many will take them back... to use again."

### **DRYER LINT IS FOR THE BIRDS WEEK OF APRIL 19, 2009**

"When cleaning the lint trap from your dryer, don't throw it away. Instead, place it outside where birds can easily find it, near a bird feeder or bird bath. Break up dryer lint into small, manageable pieces. They'll pick up the soft mass and USE IT TO FEATHER THEIR NESTS."

## **Retirement Announcement**

Early this month, the church and pastor received letters from Lois and Davida announcing Lois' retirement at the end of June from her position as Regional Minister for the Connecticut Conference. The texts of those letters are available in the office, but excerpts include: (from Lois) "As I reflect on our time together, I feel a deep sense of gratitude as well as sadness as I approach this transition. I give thanks for the opportunities offered to me to serve, thanks for terrific colleagues and companions, thanks for the chance to share 'the costs and joys of discipleship' with you, thanks for the many blessings I have received. I am sad that the day has come for this change; I know I will miss you and all that has brought me so much satisfaction;" and (from Davida): "As you might imagine, we have received the news of Lois' decision with mixed feelings – with joy for her at the prospect of new life with days with more leisure, and with sadness at our loss of a valued colleague."

While this transition has an impact on the churches of the Eastern Region, it falls more heavily on this congregation. While Lois is a member here and retirement might signal more participation on her part, that outcome won't be evident for a while. As the church is in an active search, that will complicate the relationship as Lois moves appropriately through this transition. Lois is scheduled to meet with the Board of Deacons in May to discuss the transition and will be with the congregation on Sunday, May 17 also to conduct an open discussion about how the search will proceed and Lois' plans during that process.

On a brighter note, included in the announcement from the conference is an invitation to the celebration of Lois' ministry. Please mark your calendars for Pentecost Sunday, May 31 at 5:30 pm, beginning with a service of worship followed by a reception. The United Congregational Church in Tolland will host the event.

### **Dear Parents and those who care about youth,**

Drinking, sex, violence, depression, school failure, and harassment. These are just some of the daily realities of life for many of today's adolescents. *Middle School Confessions* is an eye-opening documentary that takes a look at the lives of young people, as well as the efforts of parents, teachers and school officials to help kids navigate through these often difficult transitional years. This show features candid interviews with 11 to 14 year old students.

Here are some of the facts:

- 31% of adolescents have had sexual intercourse by age 15
- 9% of U.S. students drop out of school every year
- 26% of 12 year olds said they were unsure about their sexual identity
- 22% of middle school students reported being threatened with physical violence by other students
- Every hour 57 teenagers try to kill themselves
- Over 50% of 8<sup>th</sup> graders have tried alcohol in the last year.
- 25% of 8<sup>th</sup> graders admitted getting drunk

Please join us on **WEDNESDAY MAY 6<sup>TH</sup> at 7:30pm** to watch this documentary in Fellowship Hall. Following the viewing we will then open the floor for discussion and questions. This evening has been set aside for **adults only**. I know when I first heard these facts, my reaction was "not our kids", but the reality of it is if it is not our kids, then it is our children's friends, our neighbors, etc. It takes a village today to raise children and we all need to know the reality that these young people face on a daily basis. **Please try to join us on Wednesday May 6<sup>th</sup> at 7:30pm**, and invite a friend along!

## *Monthly Stewardship Message*

*Imagine yourself in the story ... almost a meditation*

*Then he said to them "whose head is on this and whose title?...When they heard this, they left him and went away. (Matthew 22: 20, 22)*

The Pharisees and Herodians are gone. All the people trying to trap Jesus left. In fact, all the stresses in your life have temporarily slunk away. Some of those stresses involve money – a debt, a legacy, a job worry. People were never able to challenge Jesus with money problems. He let them go. So can you.

You are in the story with Jesus and his circle of disciples. He told his challengers they should render

God, God-things, and render the contemporary world things that belong to it. You do render God prayer, worship, little deeds of justice or compassion – a letter to your senator, work at the soup kitchen, care for someone who is young or old or lonely, your offering. But the denarius, the twenty dollar bill? You want to ask Jesus how you should render your money. There are so many good things. Groceries – good. Something for a child – prom dress, gymnastics lesson, college education – good. A vacation -- good. Rent, a car payment ... a new car -- good.

Do you think God doesn't care how you use money that doesn't go to church? Wrong. Jesus sits with a denarius, waiting to show every disciple a different face on it – a *this-world* place that is right for *this* coin. Jesus holds out a coin to you (or maybe a bill). What do you see? The face on the coin is not harmful but hopeful. It may be inexpensive or a big investment. It's best for you, those you love, those around you, and some you don't even know.

Holding the coin, think what spending this money means. What other things will it touch? What other people? The face on the coin will be different another day. Close your imaginary hand and ask God to bless it. When you open your hand, the coin will be gone; but the memory will be there.

The former president's ideas are expressed with perfect clarity; his book, of course, represents a personal point of view, but one that is certainly grounded in both knowledge and wisdom. His outlook on the problem not only contributes to the literature of debate surrounding it but also, just as importantly, delivers a worthy game plan for clearing up the dilemma. Recommended for high school age and beyond.

When God Winks at You by Squire Rushnell

Think God isn't listening? Or do you not want to bother Him again, not when He has so many big issues to deal with? Sometimes a person can feel so small...but your Maker not only knows you intimately; He cares about each and every detail. There are no minutiae when it comes to you-*a godwink*-to let you know He's there. And that He's listening. Recommended for high school age and beyond.

Traveling Mercies Some Thoughts on Faith by Anne Lamott

Anne Lamott claims the best two prayers she knows are "Help me, help me, help me" and "Thank you, thank you, thank you." Despite-or because of-her irreverence and wit, faith is a natural subject for Lamott. With an exuberant mix of passion, insight, and humor, in *Traveling Mercies* she takes us on a journey through her often troubled past to illuminate her devout but quirky walk of faith. In a narrative spiced with stories and scripture, with diatribes, laughter, and tears, Lamott tells how, against all odds, she came to believe in God and then, even more miraculously, in herself. Recommended for adults.
